Access to HealthCare

Objective:

Increase the number of Henry County residents getting preventative care by providing equitable health care services people use and understand by 2028.

Strategy:

Increase culturally competent healthcare workforce across the county including in underserved communities.

2021 Progress:

Organized group of community health workers (CHW) who identified need for addition CHW and changes to funding system. Recognized need to promote CHW services through local healthcare providers and community leaders. Hired Spanish speaking CHW.

2022 Progress:

Henry County Cares, the CHW program, has grown through partnership referrals from HCC & CHS and additional bilingual staff have been added. Additional funding was established, and partnership growth was evident in the increase of partner referrals and education. Henry County Hospital worked with partners to promote healthcare workforce development.

Economic Stability

Objective:

Improve the economic stability of Henry County by creating a stable workforce through access to equitable jobs with opportunities for advancement, available daycare for all shifts and affordable housing.

Strategy:

Develop sector-based workforce initiatives. Improve and expand childcare. Increase affordable housing.

2021 Progress:

Developed Employee Advocate Program to support residents attain gainful employment. Evaluated local daycare availability and needs. Worked with local leaders to survey and assess current housing options.

2022 Progress:

Partnership programming continued to advance education regarding local employment opportunities. Soul Food Café partnered with youth to grow employment experience and education. Barriers for daycare were identified and continue to be discussed and investigated. Work to increase affordable housing continues.

Mental Health

Objective:

Reduce Henry County youth and adults with depression and reduce Henry County youth and adult contemplating, attempting, and completing suicide by 2028.

Strategy:

Increase awareness of mental health, suicide and depression. Increase awareness of community mental health resources.

2021 Progress:

Completed readiness assessment of suicide and depression. Developed plans to expand #4YourMentalHealth program. Identified NOCAC Resource Guide as listing for all services.

2022 Progress:

Henry County Resource Guide was completed. Distribution was throughout the county through hard copies, business cards, and education occurred to promote QR code/online use. #4YourMentalHealth attended 10 community events to promote mental health resources. Suicide Coalition held annual breakfast that was targeted to schools and businesses.

Substance Misuse

Objective:

Reduce the number of unintentional drug overdose deaths by 2028.

Strategy:

Establish naloxone education and distribution plan. Create rapid response team. Provide information and referral line.

2021 Progress:

Launched Project DAWN- began distributing naloxone kits and training individuals on how to use them. Determined response teams needed.

2022 Progress:

Distribution of naloxone continued to spread throughout the community with 269 kits provided. Overdose Awareness Day (8/31/2022) was proclaimed by local leaders. QRT team was created to reach out to substance users by breaking down barriers to recovery. QRT team is a partnership with HCHD, law enforcement, and Ohio Guidestone. Local residents began a support group for those experiencing loss due to overdose.

General Summary: Access to Healthcare is about getting people health care. It has been determined Henry County has: a hospital, an urgent care facility, a federally qualified health center, physicians and other health care providers, and a high percentage of residents have health insurance. The tools are in place. Residents must now access the healthcare they deserve by getting the preventative care they are entitled by establishing a provider through access to preventative care they will have better access when an acute medical issue arises as they are an established patient. This is done through community health workers, workforce development and community leadership. This group membership has grown 133% from 15 in 2019 to 25 members in 2021 and 35 members in 2022. A. Develop sector-based workforce initiatives*	 CIC conducted 2 programs to bridge the gap between school and employers. The first informed students about local career choices in farming, manufacturing, healthcare by taking them to job sites. Emmanuel Lutheran Church is providing food service experience for local youth through the Soul Food Café. Soul Food Café provides community dinners in which youth are learning food service skills by greeting guests, taking orders, serving, and bussing tables. JFS has hired a Youth Services Worker to assist the Comprehensive Case Management and Employment Program to build career paths and find employment for eligible youth ages 14-24. The Employee Advocate partnership between HCTN Job Coaching Program and HCHD Social Support Community Health Worker did not develop further. B. Improve and expand childcare*	 Completed a county survey of 68 local parents with young children that identified the biggest need regarding daycares are: 2nd/3rd shift and licensed childcare. Worked with area childcare businesses to determine if any would expand into 2nd / 3rd shift and determine if they have interest in being certified by the State's Step up to Quality Program. We found no local childcare interested in expansion. YWCA of Northwest Ohio did a feasibility study of the cost of daycare start-up cost for both home and center based daycares. The workgroup continues its work with local leadership on housing development in Henry County. Discussions continue with Robert Bender, The Provident Companies for the expansion of Oakwood Village Apartments. Pastor Jennifer Miller of St. Paul United Methodist Church is starting a Warming Prayer Vigil to provide a warm place to sleep for those experiencing homelessness. General summary: Substance Misuse membership increase in membership moving from 15 members in 2020 to 34 members in 2021 to 37 members in 2022 showing a 147% increase in membership. Members including 1st responders, law enforcement, recovery services, hospital, judicial courts and residents are active and committed to significant change. The barrier the group faces is securing sustainable funding for all strategies. The group will begin to look at proactive efforts to decrease substance misuse in Henry County.
