Appendix D: Outbreak Detection

Below you will find a broken-down list of diseases taken from the 2022 ODJFS Communicable Disease Chart. Please review the information included on this document as well as the ODJFS *Communicable Disease Fact Sheets for Child Care Providers* document for guidance on proper outbreak detection and management. This list contains many of the diseases that could potentially occur at a daycare facility. The list is broken down into three major categories of symptom and mode of transmission. Daycare facilities are not expected to be familiar with every disease listed below. However, this list should be available for quick reference whenever there is doubt as to whether a disease should be reported. This breakdown should also help in identification of the following:

- What disease is spreading in the facility?
- How has the disease been spreading in the facility?
- What symptoms should the staff be mindful of during the outbreak?
- Is the disease vaccine preventable?

Please note that an outbreak can occur in your facility with any one of these diseases as well as any disease that is not on this list. If your facility receives notification of multiple absences being attributed to the same or a similar illness, please notify HCHD immediately.
