BACKGROUND

ADOLESCENT HEALTH RESILIENCY GRANT

Through the Ohio Department of Health Bureau of Child and Family Health

"The overall aim of the adolescent health resiliency projects is to equip adults who work with adolescents to be trauma-informed and to provide opportunities for a safe and supportive connection to trusted adults within the community."

ENVIRONMENTAL SCAN PURPOSE

"The environmental scan will determine what trauma-informed work has already occurred, identifying adults who engage with adolescents across the community and identify community agencies to partner with for the project. The environmental scan should also include identifying strengths, opportunities, and potential barriers, as well as developing a plan for implementation." ¹

TIMELINE

NWO's environmental scan was created, distributed, and analyzed during Q2 (January - March) of the 2024 grant year.

METHODS

SURVEY CREATION & PARTICIPANT SELECTION

Health departments in Henry, Putnam, and Williams County worked collaboratively to develop a survey and select participants in order to complete an environmental scan detailing trauma-informed care trainings and services in Northwest Ohio. Each individual county worked with their Advisory Committees to gather feedback about question selection, distribution techniques, and participant selection. Health department staff from each county took Advisory Committee feedback and crafted questions for the survey and developed a participant tracking spreadsheet. Survey questions and participant lists were finalized on March 5th, 2024.

SURVEY DISTRIBUTION

The Northwest Ohio Trauma Informed Care Services survey was distributed via Google Forms between March 6th, 2024 and March 22nd, 2024. Each health department sent out survey links to their own lists and contacts. The same background and instruction verbiage was used by all three health departments to stay consistent. A follow-up email was

sent on March • 18, 2024. One survey was completed via OR code.



RESULTS


RESPONSE RATE

The survey was sent to 66 agencies across Northwest Ohio. Each of the three counties sent the survey to existing contacts to ensure name recognition and increase the response rate of the survey. Individual county response rates ranged from 51% to almost 67%. Overall, 37 local agencies responded and the aggregate response rate was 56%.




AREAS REPRESENTED

Responses came from agencies covering all of Northwest Ohio, including all counties expressing interest in being involved in this project. Henry, Putnam, and Williams counties were some of the highest represented.



RESULTS



Respondents were asked if their agency or organization provided trauma-informed training adults who worked with youth ages 10-24. This allowed us to gather data on work that was already being done in this area in Northwest Ohio. Out of the 37 respondents, 13 (or 35%) said they did provide trauma-informed training.

AGENCIES PROVIDING TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE TRAINING TO ADULTS WORKING WITH YOUTH

CURRICULUMS USED*

A variety of programs and curriculums are being used to train adults in trauma-informed care in Northwest Ohio. These include trainings through workforce development organizations like Relias and Starr Commonwealth, evidence-based models like I-FAST, Teaching Family model, and Mental Health First Aid, courses/trainings through higher education institutes, individual therapeutic interventions like EMDR, and self-created evidence-based models based on practice.

RESULTS: AGENCIES PROVIDING TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE TRAINING TO ADULTS WORKING WITH YOUTH

PRIMARY ROLE OF TRAINED ADULTS

Respondents were asked to share the primary role of the adults trained through trauma informed care curriculum. Responses included counselors, therapists, first responders, coaches, pastors, foster parents, social workers, case managers, and many more.




AT-RISK YOUTH SERVED BY ADULTS TRAINED




The youth populations defined as "at-risk" by the Ohio Department of Health for the purposes of this grant are rural, female, LGBTQ+, Hispanic, non-Hispanic multicultural, and low-income. All at-risk youth demographics are served by adults trained by the agencies surveyed.

RESULTS: AGENCIES NOT PROVIDING TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE TRAINING TO ADULTS WORKING WITH YOUTH

Out of the 37 respondents of the environmental scan survey, 24 do not provide traumainformed care training to adults working with youth. This information will allow us to target organizations who may be interested in receiving training for their staff.




AGENCIES THAT PROVIDE SERVICES FOR YOUTH



Agencies who do not provide trauma-informed training care asked if provide they were services for youth. Out of the 24 respondents, 2 agencies stated they do not provide services for youth. Both agencies answering may not provide direct services vouth, but do have the to capacity to *indirectly* impact youth in their communities.


TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE SERVICES



Agencies who do not trauma-informed care training to adults were asked if they provide trauma-informed care services to vouth. This information will be helpful when identifying partner agencies to involve in training. Out of the 24 respondents, 15 (62.5%) did not provide trauma informed for care youth. (12.5%) said they did, and (25%) said they were not sure.

AT-RISK YOUTH SERVED BY AGENCIES

All youth defined as ²⁰ "at-risk" for the ¹⁵ purposes of this grant ¹⁰ are represented in ⁵ who is being served ⁰ by surveyed agencies.



DISCUSSION

EXISTING TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE TRAININGS

The Northwest Ohio Trauma Informed Care Services survey allowed us to gather information about similar work already happening in the area. There is a range of trainings available to social service staff in NWO, including more individualistic techniques like EMDR and area-wide training offerings like Mental Health First Aid.


While 13 out of the 37 respondents offer trauma-informed training for adults who work with youth, some of those agencies/organizations could still benefit from being trained through this project. Below is a tentative list of agencies that may need additional training. Overall, there are 5 organizations we can support and 8 organizations that could benefit from additional trauma-informed training for their staff.

DISCUSSION

OPPORTUNITIES FOR TRAUMA-INFORMED TRAINING

This environmental scan revealed 24 agencies in the area that do not provide trauma-informed care training to adults. Out of agencies, these two expressed they do not provide services to youth. While these agencies indirectly provide services to youth, they will not considered in the first round of trainings offered through this project.



These agencies were then asked if they provide trauma-informed services to youth in the area. Out of the 22 agencies being considered, three of them said "yes" to this question. There may be a need in the future to bolster their trauma-informed care practices, but these three agencies will not be considered in the first round of trainings offered through this project.

The remaining agencies (19) responded "no" or "not sure" when asked if they provided trauma-informed care to the youth they serve. These agencies will be a priority when selecting training opportunities in the first round of this project.

DISCUSSION

OPPORTUNITIES FOR TRAUMA-INFORMED TRAINING


The chart below details priority level of the agencies that may need to receive trauma-informed care training to adults who work with youth, whether they expressed providing training themselves or not. High priority includes our own health departments and agencies that provide care to youth but expressed it is not trauma-informed. Mid-priority includes agencies that were unsure if they provided care that is trauma-informed and agencies that may provide training but could benefit from more. Low priority includes agencies that have robust trainings for adults, say they already provide trauma-informed care, or said they do not serve youth.


AREAS REPRESENTED




HENRY COUNTY RESULTS AT-RISK YOUTH SERVED BY ADULTS TRAINED






PUTNAM COUNTY RESULTS AT-RISK YOUTH SERVED BY ADULTS TRAINED

AGENCIES NOT PROVIDING TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE TRAINING TO ADULTS WORKING WITH YOUTH





Reponses came from agencies covering all of Northwest Ohio, including some counties expressing interest in being involved in this project. Williams County had the highest number of representatives from their own respondents.




AGENCIES PROVIDING TRAUMA-INFORMED CARE TRAINING TO ADULTS WORKING WITH YOUTH
